Atlantic Partnership Editorial

The early months of the second President Bush Administration are the best opportunity we are going to get to rebuild transatlantic relations. The President's visit to Europe in late February should be the occasion to launch the process.

Style will be important. Europeans want a strong reaffirmation from President Bush of his intention to listen more to America's allies and take more account of their concerns, as well as readiness to work with the European Union on economic, foreign policy and defence issues. They will also be listening for a less divisive and dismissive tone.

The Americans justifiably expect European leaders to avoid the fatal mistake which they made four years ago of under-estimating President Bush and treating him like a retarded schoolboy with reading and comprehension difficulties. There should be no patronizing lectures. They should also approach February's meeting in a spirit of putting past differences behind them, stop drawing up their petticoats with distaste for America's policies and be supportive over issues like North Korea and Asian security generally where Europe lets America carry the whole burden.

But though style is important, it is substance which counts. The list of transatlantic differences is a daunting one. Yet they can be overcome by imaginative and constructive diplomacy. Nothing is going to change the attitude of European opponents of America-led intervention in Iraq before the Iraqi elections at end-January. But thereafter Europe should elect for a more positive and forthcoming role, in particular when it comes to training Iraqi forces and helping on the ground with reconstruction. America should be ready to join forces with Europe to incentivise Iran to halt the suspect elements of its nuclear programme. A combined US-European effort is far more likely to be effective than a Europe-only approach with America sniping from the side-lines. Similarly with Israel/Palestine, the Europeans need to resist pirouetting to impress Arab opinion while leaving the heavy lifting to the US, and work instead on a cooperative approach through the

Quartet. President Bush has signalled his readiness to become engaged once new Palestinian leadership is in the saddle and the process of withdrawal from Gaza is under way and Europeans should give him every encouragement.

There are serious issues to take forward on the economic front: action to address the US deficit which does not leave Europe bearing the whole burden of re-adjustment: a joint push to move the Doha Round forward: resolution of the Boeing-Airbus subsidies dispute: a more cooperative approach to climate change for which there seems to be growing support in the US Senate led by John McCain.

Of course Europe and the US won't agree on everything. They never have and they never will. But in the past preserving the overall relationship was regarded as more important than prevailing in policy disputes. That has not been the case in the last four years. We need to get our priorities right again.

The relationship is never going to be the same as it was in the Cold War. Nostalgia is not a policy. We have to work out a new transatlantic bargain which takes account of the change in the threat, the emergence of disproportionate American power, and the enlargement of the European Union and its aspiration to act as a unit. We have missed that opportunity over the last four years and cannot afford to do so again.

Atlantic Partnership will continue to champion the transatlantic relationship as vigorously as ever. We have attracted speakers of extraordinary calibre this autumn and plan to field some of the leading protagonists on both sides of the Atlantic in 2005, including the NATO Secretary-General, the EU's External Trade Commissioner and leading members of the American political establishment. We hope for your continued support.

Michael Howard addressed the topic of “Britain In The World Today” at Chatham House. November 17, 2004. He said: ‘We are also not short of some international tensions nearer home. They are of a quite different order, but nevertheless of enormous significance. In the events leading up to, and in the aftermath of, the war in Iraq serious tensions have arisen between the United States and some European countries. I understand those. But I very much regret them. Even before the Iraq war, I was becoming increasingly concerned about a growing rift. That is why, when I was on the back benches, I established the non-partisan Atlantic Partnership, a think-tank which seeks to promote close relationships between Europeans and Americans. One of my worries is that for some people, the main motive for greater political union in Europe is to establish a rival to the United States. I don't want rivalry. I want partnership.’
